# What is Outcomes Based Contracting (OBC)?

# Defining OBC



 Accelerate

- A substantial part of the contract is contingent on meeting agreed upon student outcomes.
- Districts and providers commit to clearly defined responsibilities to meet student outcomes.
- Academic impact is tied to public dollars, giving partnerships a framework to understand cost effectiveness and efficacy of use.

**OBC empowers districts and providers to contract for clear student outcomes and compels mutual accountability for achieving them.**

# Goals of OBC



## Improve Procurement Practices

Enable buyers to clearly define their desired outcomes from the beginning, enhancing the educational procurement process.



## Strengthen Implementation

Ensure instructional products and services align closely with their research-backed design during implementation.



## Achieving Meaningful Outcomes

Empower districts and providers to work together in achieving meaningful results for all students, regardless of background or circumstance.

# Traditional vs. OBC Partnerships

## Traditional Partnership

## Outcomes Based Partnership

Contract is paid in full when services begin, and further payment is rendered as additional services are delivered

**Base payment** of the contract is paid when services begin, and the remainder of the contract (**contingent payment**) is paid when student outcomes are met

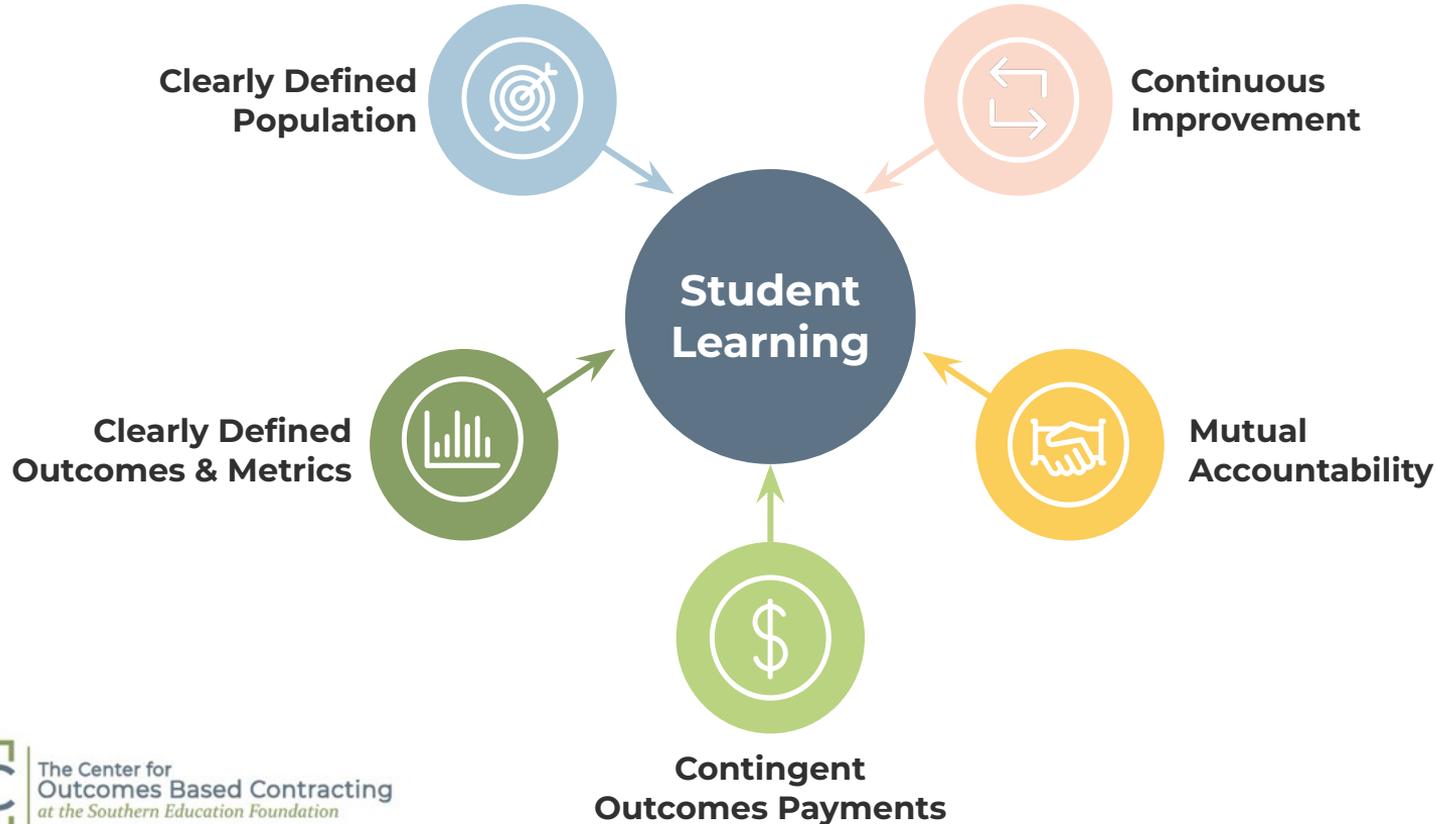
Roles and responsibilities around partnership support are not clearly defined from the start

Specific implementation expectations, as outlined through **mutual accountability**, are clearly agreed to

Stakeholders work independently to identify ways to increase usage and improve student learning

Stakeholders review data collaboratively through **continuous learning** practices and discuss opportunities for improvement together

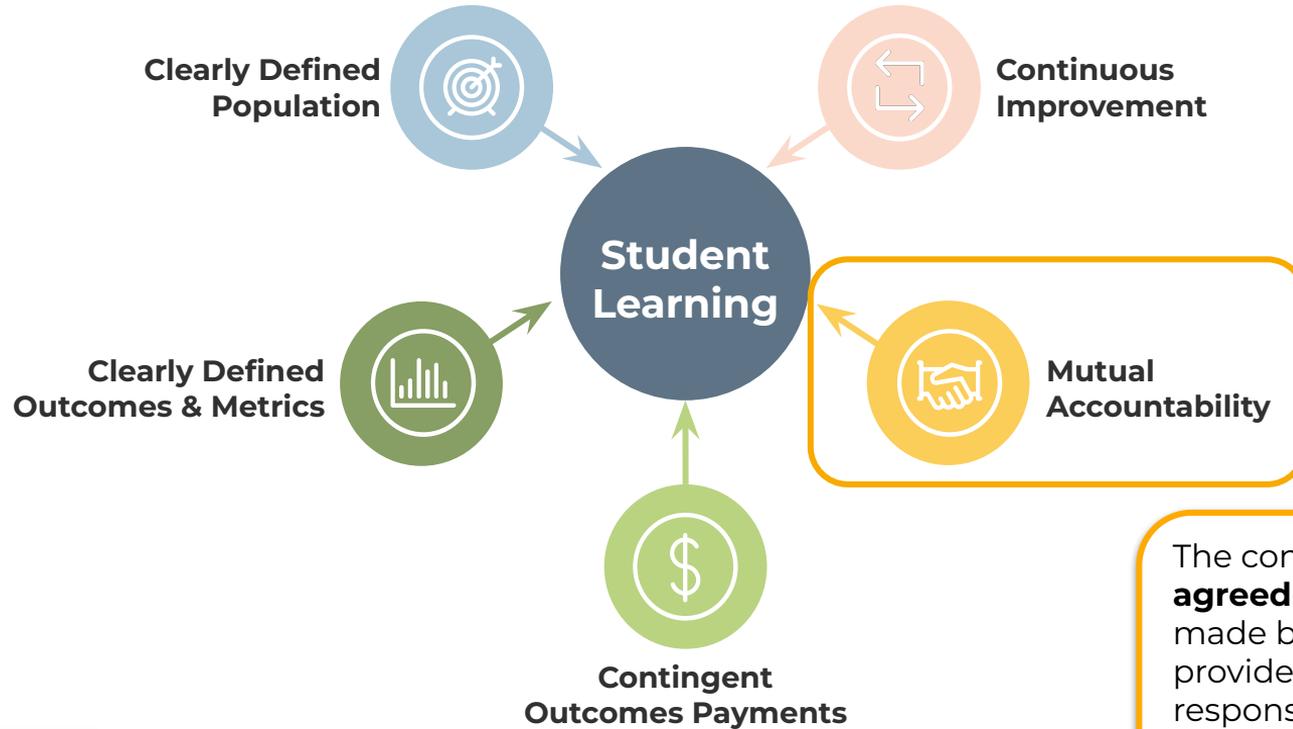

# Ingredients for a Successful OBC



The contract includes **agreed-upon commitments** made between a district and provider, ensuring each party is responsible for the achievement of student outcomes



# Compelling Mutual Accountability

Mutual accountability for achieving outcomes is **shared** by:

- District Instructional Leadership
- School Leadership & Teachers
- Data and Assessment Team
- Finance and Contracting
- District Leadership
- Provider

# Mutual Accountability is Clarity

- **Clear Expectations:** Mutual accountability begins with clearly defined expectations.
- **Transparent Communication:** Open and honest communication is key to clarity.
- **Defined Roles and Responsibilities:** Clearly outlining who is responsible for what helps prevent overlap and confusion, ensuring that everyone knows their specific role within the larger objective.
- **Measurable Outcomes:** Establishing clear metrics for success allows the team to objectively assess progress and adjust strategies as needed.

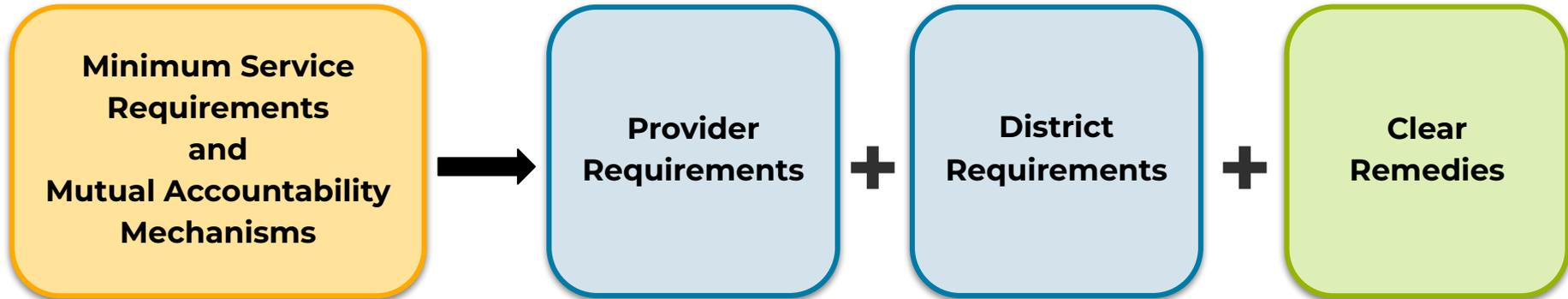


# Mutual Accountability is Partnership

	<b>Shared Responsibility</b>	<p>Mutual accountability fosters a culture where everyone feels equally responsible for the success of the project or initiative.</p>
	<b>Collective Ownership</b>	<p>When accountability is shared, team members take collective ownership of both successes and challenges.</p>
	<b>Mutual Support</b>	<p>In a true partnership, team members actively support one another, offering help when needed and celebrating each other's achievements. This builds trust and a sense of community within the team.</p>
	<b>Continuous Growth Together</b>	<p>Mutual accountability drives continuous growth and improvement. Regular team reflection helps refine strategies, celebrate successes, and improve performance.</p>

# How Does This Happen?

Through a **comprehensive framework** for mutual accountability that defines **specific** obligations, remedies, and processes ensuring both districts and providers have **concrete responsibilities** for creating the conditions necessary for **student success**, with **clear remedies** when expectations aren't met.



# Provider Requirements

	Design and drive an <b>Implementation Success Plan</b> , which includes professional learning, a success manager, and a continuous improvement process
	Provide weekly usage <b>reports</b> , associated <b>recommendations</b> , and other key metrics of engagement and progress
	Design and engage in a <b>continuous improvement process</b> with the district throughout the implementation period, including tracking satisfaction
	This <b>pricing is inclusive</b> and the Provider should not expect to charge any additional fees (for project management, travel, etc.).
	Ensures that students have the <b>same tutor for 80%</b> of tutoring sessions.

## District Requirements

	<p>Ensure students can <b>access</b> the platform, meeting hardware, software and bandwidth requirements stated by the Provider.</p>
	<p>Ensure students access the technology platform and services, as prescribed by the <b>minimum attendance requirements of the Provider</b>, including a “start by” date and a total duration (e.g, number of weeks) of the program.</p>
	<p>Share student attendance, performance, and other <b>student data</b>, as allowable by state and federal law, to enable the Provider to provide instructionally appropriate content to students.</p>
	<p>For any student who <b>falls below</b> an average attendance rate of 70%, the District may be required to pay both base and outcome payment(s) for that student for a given timeframe.</p>
	<p>Outlines schedule of <b>continuous improvement meetings</b> for district participants.</p>

# State-Based Cohort Model

## Provider-Specific Technical Assistance Provided by OBC Team

### SEA Partnership for Preferred Provider List

Partner with SEA to support development of preferred provider list based on OBC requirements & provider readiness



### SEA Engagement & Support Strategy

Plan with SEA for how to engage providers and best balance support and accountability based on local context (eg, co-host shared provider learning with SEA concurrent with district learning)
